The Florida College of Emergency Physicians is committed to building strong relationships amongst emergency physicians as well as aiding in the development of tomorrow's emergency physicians. As part of this commitment, FCEP has recently developed the *Medical Student Mentor Program*. This program was developed as a resource to prospective applicants to the specialty of EM with the goal of improving professional success and increasing interest in emergency medicine as a whole. Through a structured mentor relationship, they can gain insight into the specialty of EM as well as have their questions answered by an established emergency physician. This mentor relationship can be a critical resource during a time when medical students are making some of the most important decisions of their academic careers.

That's where *you* come in. In order to provide mentors to our medical students, we need to build a database of mentors who share our commitment to mentorship. By becoming a mentor, you will build a relationship with one or more students who are interested in EM. You will help to guide them and answer questions based on your past experiences and unique perspectives. You may have some insight on residency programs and their strengths, residency application tips, or simply basic questions about life as a practicing emergency physician. Communication may be via phone call or email. Some mentors may volunteer to speak or participate in a panel discussion at an emergency medicine interest group. Your time commitment can be as little as 2 hours per academic year, which mostly involves an open communication with your mentee. Your experiences and advice can be invaluable to a medical student who is navigating through one of the most important career crossroads that they'll face.

You will have full support of FCEP including printed resources and support of the program's co-directors, Drs. Mansour and Hoelle. In doing so, know that you are making a difference in the specialty of emergency medicine and you will be helping to shape the landscape of tomorrow's emergency physicians.
